

Language, Industry and Language Industry

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- Language refers to the complex system of symbols, either written or spoken, acquired and used by human for communication.
- Industry refers to the production of an economic good or service within an economy.
- Language represents one of the least obvious associations with the industry.



- Language industry refers to the sector of activity dedicated to designing, producing and marketing tools, products or services that benefit from machine understanding of human language.
- It is part of information technology that draws on linguistics and software engineering.




- This presentation intends to show
 - that linguistics, the scientific study of language, has great potentials to demonstrate its social and economic accountability and
 - that, when carefully and appropriately targeted, effective language industry can be fostered to yield a direct bearing on the well-being of the local, regional and international communities.



- The Department of Chinese, Translation and Linguistics represents a critical mass of expertise in the area of appliable language technology.
- In 2008, The Dialogue Systems Group was founded by Dr Alex Fang as a task force devoted to applied research in human speech and language technology.
