Methodology

- -Field research by veterinarians
- -Consultation with local stakeholders:

Government: AFCD, FEHD, Police

Users: Farmers, Traders, WWF (HK), Kadoorie Farm, Animal Houses, Vets

-Review of welfare laws of EU member states, USA, Australia, NZ, Singapore and Taiwan



Role of the OIE (World Health Organization for Animals)

- -China is an OIE member country
- -HK considers itself bound
- -Since 2002, the OIE has been providing recommendations for **positive** animal welfare (farming, transport, slaughter)
- -International recognition of the link between animal health and animal welfare



Outdated Hong Kong Legislation

- -HK has not significantly changed its law since it was introduced in 1935
- -No duty of care to animals
- -SPCA has succeeded in banning some of the worst practices but 20 years of law reform efforts have failed to make significant headway

Slaughter

Slaughterhouse legislation intended to protect food animals is out of date and ineffective

The sheer scale of the numbers of animals involved makes this a significant concern



On Farm welfare

- -No welfare laws for majority of farm animals (pigs and chickens)
- -No enclosure requirements and no stocking density in cages
- -No regulations to require humane euthanasia
- -Sick and injured animals are sold for slaughter or abandoned to die



Wet markets

Inadequate transport, enclosure and slaughter regulations

Failure to meet OIE requirements





Animals in Research

- -Only regulate experiments "calculated to cause pain"
- -<u>Voluntary</u> Animal Ethics Committees (linked to RGC funding)
- -No animal welfare officer required
- -DOH medics not aware of research practices
- -No requirement to specify humane endpoints
